Kindergarten Transition

Surf Education

Next Friday we have the Port Macquarie-Hastings Council Lifeguards visiting to talk to all students about the importance of surf and beach safety. Living in such close proximity to beaches and rivers, as well as many families with backyard pools, it is essential that we continually reinforce these safety messages with our children.

Behaviour Expectations

We have high expectations for student behaviour and systems in place to support students in maintaining appropriate behaviour in classrooms and the playground. The vast majority of students respond well to teacher guidance and are able to self-regulate their behaviour. Unfortunately some require extra assistance and consequences to be applied to support them in making positive choices. This often occurs late in a term when students become tired, and especially in Term 4 with senior students. I seek the support of our parents and carers to reinforce school expectations with their children so that our school continues to be a safe and productive learning environment for all.

Staff Changes for Term 4

Due to staff leave, some classes will have a change in teacher for next term. This will impact mostly on the 4/5DB, 5/6S and 5/6B classes. In making these changes consideration has been given to the needs of students and all efforts made to ensure continuity of teaching and learning in all classes. By teaching kids the skills to look after themselves, you are setting them up for life. Don't wait until they are teenagers to develop the skills of independent living. Start early and promote a broad skill set so that they can look after themselves if you are not around.

Resilience alternative #4: Keep expectations in line with children's abilities and don't put excessive pressure on

Resilient learners link success with effort. They don't give up because they don't like a teacher or when confronted with multi-step or more complex activities. Similarly they don't bail out of a sporting team half way through the

Resilience alternative #5: Encourage kids to complete what they have started even if the results aren't perfect, nor

Resilience alternative#6: Don't routinely do for kids what they can do for themselves.

Robber #7: Rescue kids from challenging or stretch situations

There are many times kids are put in situations that are outside their comfort zones for a time. For instance, giving a talk, singing at the school concert or going on a school camp may be challenges for some kids. They are all situations that kids usually cope with, so show your confidence in them and skill them up rather than opt for avoidance.

Resilience alternative #7: Teach kids that overcoming challenges enables them to grow and improve.

Robber #4: Put unrealistic or relentless pressure on kids to perform

The final four 'Resilience Robbers' taken from an article by parenting educator and author, Michael Grose, are explained below. Most parents would recognise that despite having the best of intentions, we can sometimes make decisions that are 'easier' in the short-term, but not in our children's long-term best interests. Perhaps some of these strategies may be helpful for your family.

easily meet them. Too high and kids can give up. Too much and kids can experience anxiety.





'Visible learning' - what does it actually mean?

Visible learning is a concept coined by Melbourne-based educational researcher John Hattie, and in a nutshell, it's about helping students take responsibility for their learning. Teachers are transparent with them about why they're learning what they're learning, they help students set goals for themselves, and encourage them to see areas that are strengths for them, and areas they feel they need to work on more, all the while encouraging children to actively seek feedback on their work. The idea is that kids can see what they're doing and why it's going to be of more value to them and can help them achieve.

In the classroom this can look like big bright posters, showing each student's progression, there can be questions stuck up along the wall with funny acronyms, there can be catchphrases and ideas that your child might come home with or sticker charts documenting what they're up to.

While it's mainly a teaching tool implemented at the school, it's useful for us to understand at home, so that we can support our kids as they develop new learning skills. There are also some neat ideas we can adopt at home to help our kids become confident and independent.

So how can we support our kids at home with this Visible Learning stuff?

We focus on effort, not outcome

At home, we can model this to our children by looking at the effort we put in as being the bigger part of success. The outcome doesn't have to be perfect every time, because we're learning. We're always learning. And what we don't do so well now, we can build on next time. When our children are faced with visible learning at school, they can look for the effort they've put in, and even if the goal hasn't been entirely achieved, they can feel good knowing they've worked hard, and see where they might need some additional support to achieve their goals. Research shows us when we focus on effort and not results, we have greater growth and success overall.

Let our children know this all about them – not their classmates!

Some kids might find it a bit confronting, or find themselves comparing their progress to others. That is NOT what visible learning is meant to be about. I've seen parents though my role who have become upset, as their child has come home anxious, thinking others are better than them and getting 'more stickers' on the class chart. It's not about what little Jenny can do, or what little Jimmy hasn't done, or even where they are in class, in relation to their friends. It's just about focusing on them; what goals they want to achieve, and what they're learning right here, right now. We all learn at different rates and that's OK.

Encourage feedback

A big part of Visible Learning is seeking feedback. So, a child seeks out feedback from the teacher as they complete activities, while also actively identifying what they did well, as well as the areas they may need some additional support. At home, we can have our kids try a new task or chore, and then come to us to seek feedback when they're done. We can ask them how they think they went, and what they feel they could try next time if it didn't quite go to plan. We can also make it a bit interactive and ask our kids to provide feedback on something we've tried.

In essence, Visible Learning leads our kids to learn very important lessons; taking responsibility for their own learning and setting goals for their development. Those are the sorts of skills we hope to see in all aspects of life, not just schooling. So it makes sense to use some of the same language at home and to follow the same kinds of ideas. Learning is a continuous journey, and not about reaching some designated destination. Being on the same page as our children's schools will help everyone involved.

SCHOOL SWIMMING SCHEME

Arrangements have been made to include a Learn to Swim program in our school curriculum.



The Department of Education and Training School Swimming Scheme is an intensive learn to swim

program, which develops water confidence and provides students with basic skills in water safety and survival. The scheme is conducted over ten days. Each daily lesson is 45 minutes.

Students who have not reached a satisfactory standard of water safety and survival skills, and are unable to swim 25m confidently unaided in deep water, are eligible to participate in the School Swimming Scheme. The Scheme focuses on weak swimmers in Year 2 and 3 but provides for weak swimmers in Years 4 to 6 as well as students with special needs such as new arrivals in Australia and students with disabilities.

Instruction will take place at Kendall Pool.

The scheme will continue **daily for two weeks** from Monday 12th November (Week 5) to Friday 23rd November (Week 6).

Through generous donations from the Men's Shed and Big A Plumbing we have been able to heavily subsidise the program. Total cost for the 2 weeks will be \$15 per child. This includes pool entry and 10 days of intensive lessons.

Please do not send any money. Permission notes and further information will be sent home to parents early in Term 4.
